FROM THE RECTORY

April 5–7, the weekend after Easter, the Vestry and I (plus our treasurer, Wayne Cook) will be traveling to Holy Cross Monastery in West Park, New York, for a retreat. During this time away we hope to get to know one another better, participate in the prayers, services, and silences of the monastery, and begin to discern and reflect on where God is calling St. Michael's in the next few months and years.

Last year, the new Vestry also attended a retreat at Holy Cross, but much of our discussion at that time had to do with the construction project that was about to begin. Now that our construction is nearly finished, we will turn our attention to present and future ministries of St. Michael's.

St. Michael's is coming out of a period of fours years of rapid change. You have said goodbye to a long-term rector, weathered a year-and-a-half interim period, and hired a new settled rector. In the midst of these changes of leadership, St. Michael's has planned and executed a capital campaign that met its goal of \$800,000, and then saw through a disruptive and exciting building project. It may feel to us that it is time to sit back and take a breather, but we are called now to a different kind of work: the work of discernment and visioning.

Now that we have our much-longed-for accessible, flexible, and beautiful building, what are we going to do with it? What are the new ministries to which God is calling us? What is the new thing God is doing in our midst? Rest assured that the Vestry will want to engage you (the congregation) and the people in our community with these kinds of questions.

The work of discernment among community does not have the same practical landmarks of a rector search or a capital campaign or a building project. We will not always be able to say, "We are starting here and finishing there." The process of discernment can be frustrating and can demand a lot of patience and trust—trust that God is truly working, even when we cannot always see with clarity.

I hope you will keep the Vestry and the leadership of St. Michael's in your prayers during this time. I also hope that you will begin your own process of prayer and reflection about how we are being called to follow Christ in our lives together at St. Michael's.

RECOVERY SUNDAY APRIL 21

Sunday, April 21, at both the worship services and in the Adult Forum, we will celebrate the presence of God working today to call people back to health and wholeness, not only within our parish but the entire community. This Sunday we name and celebrate that movement of God we call recovery. When we hear of "recovery" we quickly think of alcohol and drug addiction. Recovery is really much larger. It is about reclaiming our heritage as children of God in the face of anything that takes power over us. It may be food, work, or the need for approval, for starters.

At both services the speaker will be Ed Sbardella, a member of the parish telling his story of recovery, indeed his "good news story" that continues to work every day. The lessons and hymns will reflect the recovery theme. As we intentionally invite people from the larger community during these services, we will use grape juice at Communion. This is an excellent time to invite a friend who might be interested to come to church with you.

So join the family of St. Michael's as it celebrates the presence of the same God that created the universe at the beginning of time and is still creating new life by calling us all to recover and reclaim our heritage as daughters and sons of God.



PLANNED GIVING PROGRAM LAUNCHED

St. Michael's launched its first-ever Planned Giving program at a festive lunch on February 24. With more than 40 parishioners present, we were delighted to outline the program and provide written information to everyone who attended.

Our church has been enriched throughout its history by the generous giving of its members, both during their lifetimes and after their deaths. As part of our program, we will seek to honor past, present, and future donors through a St. Michael's Legacy Society. Everyone who remembers St. Michael's in their wills, or makes another type of planned gift no matter what the amount will automatically be a member. We will install a large plaque with the names of Legacy Society members in one of our common areas (though you may choose to remain anonymous if you wish).

In a few weeks, we plan to mail everyone in the parish a copy of the Planned Giving brochure, which will give you the basic information you need to begin thinking about this important issue. Remember, it's not the amount that matters, it's the intention. God has given you what you have. As a good steward, what arrangements have you made for it when God calls you home?

HELP, THANKS, WOW: THE THREE ESSENTIAL PRAYERS BY ANNE LAMOTT



If prayer is the first wireless communication, then this is a user manual. I have heard people voice concern about their distance from God. Some speak with uncertainty as to what constitutes prayer. So how do we connect to the Power Source? This little book gives us information on the three basic types of prayers Anne Lamotte uses. I find that most of my prayers fit into those categories, too. We start with where we are. We may have to overcome our past and reframe what and how we think of God. There is nothing wrong with preassembled prayers, but a deep interaction with the Higher Power may come at the strangest times and at the most basic levels.

When our lives are in shambles, there may be nothing left in us but a plea for help. That essential prayer may come in many forms. It may come in wordless weeping, or in a rant at the Almighty. Our life is broken, and we can't fix it. We need help to go on, and we ask for help. And that help is there. We need to ask so that we can receive. We need to open ourselves and let God in to allow the intimate communion.

And we give thanks, the next essential prayer. Thanks may be offered for great food or a parking space or a cancer remission. What is prayer and what is prayer? Does God want our happy chatter or praise in public? Does God want to know our deep opinions about someone or something we hate? Or do we need to learn to live in quiet gratitude? This learning may take deep life transformation. You learn to let others go first, even if they don't notice, because you know, and God knows, and that process changes you deeply. Thanks. You feel that connection. It's all about thanks.

The third essential prayer can come as we behold unimaginable devastation or unspeakable beauty—something that is beyond our words, but not beyond God. It comes to us, unbidden, from the depths of our soul, leaving us breathless and wordless but with a need to communicate that which we cannot. It is the



prayer of the stunned, as we behold the calving glacier, or as the World Trade Center comes down. When all we can say in response is Wow, it is a prayer of awe. As the author explains, "we had this all figured out, and now we don't." Wow!

This book makes a good introduction to a great author. She is holding a mirror in which we see ourselves, and God is with us. No matter what happens, or what we do or don't do, God keeps the options of communications open, because that is what God does. Grace, progress, and blessings continue to be


given to you, because God gives. All we need do is ask. Help. Thanks. Wow. Amen.



The Resurrection by William Blake (1757–1827)







CHANTING OUR PRAYERS: WHAT ARE GOD'S PEOPLE'S PRAYING FOR?

This past Lent the 10:15 service had a new way of praying the Prayers of the People: we were led in chant by two cantors who offered broad corporate petitions and bid the people to pray, saying "What are God's people praying for?" This was accompanied by an Indian instrument called a shruti, which is a small box that produces pitches using a hand-operated bellows. Paul and I experienced these forms of prayers during our recent trip to a conference at Bishop's Ranch in California, and we found them most moving and wanted to bring them back to you. Prayer is at the heart of our spiritual life, I think, and finding ways to expand and enhance our prayer life is both important and exciting.

Thanks to Karen Guthrie, I have been getting the Lenten email meditations from the Society of St. John in Cambridge, and one recent one about prayer really spoke to me. In it, Br. Tristram speaks about the potential for excessive chatter in prayers, and not enough listening for God's voice. He quite amusingly says that we pray by talking quite a bit and then feeling proudly done, "leaving God to say, 'Hang on, I haven't said anything yet!'"

In another one of these short meditations, Br. Almquist observes that we often pray by coming

before God with our list of concerns and needs, hoping that we can get God's attention and response. Br. Almquist proposes a rather different concept of prayer, which is quite the opposite. He proposes that the desire to pray in the first place becomes a prayer originating from God. We pray because God has caught our attention! We then become the answer to God's prayer, and we are invited to be a collaborator. This of course means learning to listen to the voice of God in dialogue during prayer.

This is why these chanted prayers have featured less specific corporate petitions, more space for our own hearts to speak, and, most importantly, for God to speak to us. Of course, there is no one "right" way to pray. There are as many paths to the divine as there are hearts that seek. God loves to be in communication with us, of that I am sure.

NEW WAYS TO THINK ABOUT GOD, JESUS, AND OURSELVES

We will explore the rich diversity in the early Church's understanding of God, Jesus, and their place in the world. Uniformity of belief and orthodoxy only came about later in the Christian tradition as a response to internal and external threats.

We will ask what is the truth of Christianity. Is it what we say?.. believe? ..worship? what we do? The invitation is to think out of the box all the time, honoring the rich heritage (the box) that brings us to the place where we want to go deeper. We are not looking to devalue our heritage but to enlarge the possibilities within it.
