FROM THE RECTORY

Last year our Lenten series was called "Living Faithfully in a Culture of Violence." We explored violence in our culture-domestic violence, bullying, violence in the media, violence in the Bible. This topic arose in response to the tragic shootings at the Sandy Hook School in Newtown, Connecticut. Lent seemed the right time to address honestly subjects that are difficult to face. Although these topics were not easy to discuss, there was a sense of comfort and support in struggling with them together, as a community of faith.

Last fall, Nicholas and Dorothy Porter and their two daughters, Thea and Rebecca, moved to Brattleboro. Nicholas, an Episcopal priest, had left his position as rector of Trinity Church in Southport, Connecticut, to devote himself full-time to a ministry called Jerusalem Peacebuilders, http://jerusalempeacebuilders.org. Jerusalem Peacebuilders is "an interfaith non-profit organization with the mission of creating a better future for humanity across religions, cultures, and nationalities. Our programs focus on uniting Palestinian, Israeli, and American youth and provide them with the opportunities and skills they will need to become future leaders for peace in their global communities."

For our Lenten series this year, Nicholas is graciously putting together a series of evening lectures for St. Michael's and for the wider community about the Middle East. We see this topic as a continuation of our series from last year-just as we explored issues of violence in our nation, we will explore the complexities of international conflict in the Middle East. We hope this series will help us to be better informed about the world, and offer a safe, supportive environment in which to address issues of violence and conflict on a global scale.

MIDDLE EAST FORUMS: LENTEN SERIES BEGINS MARCH 9

St. Michael's is teaming up with local organization Jerusalem Peacebuilders to offer a Lenten series that focuses on the peoples and challenges of the Middle East, beginning with the Adult Forum on Sunday, March 9. Below is a schedule of events.

You are welcome to attend any or all of the events. For the evening sessions, childcare will be provided from 6:15-8:00 p.m. in the Sunday School Room. All of the forums are open to the public, so please extend invitations to those in our wider community.

Our evening schedule will be:

- *Simple Supper:* 5:30–6:30 p.m. Come when you can for soup, sandwiches, and conversation in the Undercroft.
- *Evening Prayer:* 6:15–6:40 p.m. Come and worship in the beauty of holiness during this Lenten season. Worship held in the church.
- *Forum:* 6:45–8:00 p.m. A lecture and a time for questions in the Meeting Room.

Sunday morning, March 9 (Adult Forum)—Middle East Primer with Nicholas Porter, an Episcopal priest and founder and director of Jerusalem Peacebuilders. He has a master's degree in Middle East Studies from the American University in Cairo, a master's degree in War Studies from King's College at the University of London and an M.Div. from the Berkeley Divinity School at Yale. He was ordained to the priesthood in 1995 and has served as curate at St. George's Cathedral in Jerusalem and as sub-dean and canon pastor at the American Cathedral in Paris. He served as Rector of Trinity Church in Southport, Connecticut, from 2006–2013.

Tuesday evening, March 11—Shattered Mosaic: Refugees in the Middle East Crises led by

Christopher George of Integrated Refugee & Immigrant Services (IRIS). IRIS is a program of the Episcopal Diocese of Connecticut and is the local affiliate of Episcopal Migration Ministries and the Immigration and Refugee Program of Church World Service. IRIS resettles approximately 200 refugees each year and provides some services to asylees and other immigrants. Currently, IRIS' refugee clients come from Afghanistan, Congo, Cuba, Eritrea, Ethiopia, Iran, Iraq, Sudan, and other countries.

Tuesday evening, March 18—The Future's Hinge: Afghanistan and the 2014 Future led by Marin Strmecki, Senior Vice President and Director of Programs of the Smith Richardson Foundation in Westport, Connecticut. He has recently worked in a variety of advisory capacities in the U.S. government, serving as the Afghanistan Policy Coordinator and as a Special Advisor on Afghanistan in the Office of the Secretary of Defense from 2003 to 2005; an advisor to Ambassador Zalmay Khalilzad in Afghanistan and Iraq from 2004 to 2007; and as a Policy Counselor at the U.S. Mission to the United Nations.

Tuesday evening, March 25—A Land Divided: Israel-Palestine led by Phillip Wilcox, President of the Foundation for Middle East Peace. In the U.S. Foreign Service, he served in Laos, Indonesia, Bangladesh and, most recently, in Jerusalem as U.S. Consul General. In the Department of State, Wilcox has served in the Bureau for Middle Eastern and

South Asian Affairs as Director for Regional Affairs, Director for Israeli and Arab-Israeli Affairs and as Deputy Assistant Secretary of State for Middle Eastern Affairs. He also served as Principal Deputy Assistant Secretary of State for Intelligence and Research and as Ambassador at Large and Coordinator for Counter Terrorism.

Sunday morning, March 30 (Adult Forum) Devil's Play: Syria and Identity Politics led by Nicholas Porter.

In Letting Go: Organizing Strategies for Living you will learn simple, straightforward strategies for decluttering and organizing your home or office. Susan Venman, professional coach-organizer and owner of Breathing Space: Home & Office Organizing (www.breathing-space.com), will lead the discussion on issues and solutions. She offers a step-by-step plan to create efficient spaces that maximize available storage and streamline workflow. Bring your questions. This is an interactive workshop where your specific concerns will be addressed.



FOYER GROUPS: A GREAT WAY TO GET TO KNOW ONE ANOTHER BETTER

I've become a champion of supper groups, or Foyer Groups as we call them at St. Michael's, and here's how I came to write about this. Over five weeks in January and February I was in the book group on *My Bright Abyss* with about ten others, led by Mary, our Rector. We had a great time not only exploring things like the language(s) of faith and how suffering affects our beliefs and who God is to each of us, but also in getting to know one another on a deeper and more enjoyable level than we ever have a chance to do

sitting in a pew or at coffee hour. At the end of our last book session several people spoke about how nice it would be to be able to continue as a group, to continue to explore our faith as the new friends we've become.

There's a way to do this, as I've discovered. I've been in a supper group now for two years, and that's exactly what I've come to have, to share, and to really enjoy, even love, about breaking bread together several times a year. There are ten of us. Last Passover we celebrated Passover with our own Seder. We've helped one another through illnesses and grief, discovered common ground we never imagined, pot-lucked Indian, Middle Eastern, Italian, and Israeli meals, and laughed a whole bunch. We give one another recipes, plants, tools, rides, and always, always time, whatever comes up. We've become close and always relish the next time.

So, my friends, why not consider putting together your own supper group? Include those you hardly know. Discover once again the kindness of strangers. You'll never regret it. For ideas, for help, for more information speak to Lori Palmer, who's been heading up this effort for some time, or to me, or to any others you know in a supper group.
